Project Background

- Average annual visits: 2.4 million
- Transportation issues are diverse and complex
- Need for transportation plan







Island Explorer Bus System

- Established 1999
- 8 routes serving MDI and Schoodic Peninsula
- 2014 ridership: 503,000
- Acadia Gateway Center Maintenance & Operations







Safety

- Narrow roads shared by:
 - buses
 - RVs
 - cars
 - bikes
- Lack of bicycle lanes
- Emergency response delays



Visitor Experience and Enjoyment

- Crowding
- Visual obstructions and noise
- Safety concerns





Natural and Cultural Resources

- Increased air and noise pollution
- Displacement/alteration of habitats
- Erosion
- Pollution of adjacent waters
- Vehicles colliding with historic features

Preservation of Historic Roads and Features

- Narrow, winding historic roads
- Low historic bridges
- Coping stones near edge of road





Existing Infrastructure Limitations

- Busy summer months reach limits of infrastructure:
 - Island Explorer bus system reaches capacity
 - Parking lots fill up quickly
 - Parking overflows to roadsides





Impacts of Related Development

- Schoodic Woods campground/bike paths/hiking trails
- Park headquarters
- Hulls Cove visitor center
- Acadia Gateway Center
- Bar Harbor ferry terminal



Purpose of the Plan

- Provide safe and efficient transportation
- Offer a variety of high-quality experiences to visitors
- Ensure the protection of park resources and values





Environmental Impact Statement

- National Environmental Policy Act of 1969 (NEPA)
 requires federal agencies to fully consider the
 impacts of proposals that would affect the human
 environment
- NEPA also requires federal agencies to involve the interested and affected public in the decisionmaking process





Objectives of the Plan

- Desired conditions for resources and visitor experiences
- Address parking and roadway capacities
- Improve safety and reduce conflicts among visitors
- Improve transportation infrastructure
- Consider role of Acadia Gateway Center, Hulls
 Cove Visitor Center, and other development
- Coordinate with park partners and stakeholders
