Narrative Description

Summary: The Enchanted Valley Chalet is located approximately 13 miles into the backcountry of the remote and wild Olympic Mountain range. It was built by the Olympic Recreation Company from 1930-1931, which sought to develop the recreational potential of the interior Olympics. Tom E. Criswell and his son Glenn built the large, rustic, 2-1/2 story, dovetail-notched log structure, with assistance by others who packed in materials by horseback over the long trail, including bricks, mortar, and other equipment. The site for the chalet, an open grassy meadow, was chosen to facilitate the construction of the large building. For the next decade the chalet was a much advertised and favored destination point or stopping place for numerous individuals and groups out hiking and horseback riding in the wilderness of the Olympics. In 1943 the chalet was closed to the public and used briefly as an Aircraft Warning Station during World War II. In 1951 the National Park Service purchased the holdings of the Olympic Recreation Company. In 1953 the chalet reopened for public use, but limited maintenance and vandalism expedited the building's deterioration. During the summers of 1983 and 1984, the NPS, in cooperation with the Olympians hiking club of Hoquiam and Aberdeen, assisted in rehabilitating the structure to a useable and functional condition. It stands in excellent condition today in an open grassy meadow and has integrity of location, setting, design, materials, workmanship, feeling, and association.

Verbal Boundary Description

The boundary is formed by an irregular polygon defined by UTM points, which encompasses the building and surrounding open meadow and a narrow fringe of forest which defines the edge of this open meadow.

Boundary Justification

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The boundary includes the structure itself and the surrounding open meadow, traditionally used as an area for grazing the horses that carried hikers and their supplies to the chalet. Additionally, the open meadow creates an important part of the visual context of the two-story log building.
