
Women's Rights History Trail Feasibility Study

FY 1999 \$100,000 appropriated to develop a trail study

The Study Area encompassed the NPS Northeast Region – from Maine to Virginia

Declaration of Sentiments -- basis for thematic framework:

- Politics
- Education
- Economy
- Religion
- Family & Society



Overview of Legislative & Planning History

- Identified the range of Partnership Concepts now seen in the National Women's Rights History Project Legislation
- The Votes for Women History Trail emerged as a partnership concept because of the large number of political sites concentrated in the Rochester – Seneca Falls – Syracuse Corridor



Overview of Legislative & Planning History

- The Votes for Women History Trail as Described in the Feasibility Study:
 - Auto Tour Route
 - Focus on Rochester -- Seneca Falls Syracuse Area
 - Sites associated with Women's Suffrage
 - 1848 to 1923
 - Sites on or eligible for inclusion on the National Register of Historic Places
 - Gravesites and cemeteries
 - All participation is voluntary




Votes for Women History Trail Legislation

- Omnibus Public Lands
 Management Act of 2009 (P.L.
 111-11)- Title VII- Section 7111
- Legislation includes the trail but also introduced the inventory/ documentation and network concepts.
- This legislation was signed into law by President Obama on March 30, 2009.



Votes for Women History Trail Legislation

- Three provisions:
 - Votes for Women Trail Act
 - National Women's Rights History Project National Registry
 - National Women's Rights History ProjectPartnerships Network

Votes for Women Trail

- Differs from Feasibility Study in some ways
- A Vehicular Tour Route
- New York State
- Linking properties historically and thematically associated with the struggle for women's suffrage in the United States
- Sites with a verifiable connection to the U.S.
 Women's Suffrage movement including:
 - Units and programs of Women's Rights National Historical Park
 - Other federal, state. local, and private properties
 - Facilities and programs of educational, commemorative, research or interpretive nature
