Westbrook, East, and Calhoun Streets	Private (multiple owners)	This district is locally significant as a group of buildings that represent the architectural development of West Point from 1870 to about 1930. The most notable buildings are the West Point School (1928), the Rhodes House at 329 Calhoun (ca. 1882), and the house at 336 Calhoun (ca. 1890). A large percentage of the houses in the district were built during the last 20 years of the 19 th -century when the town was well established as a railroad center. There are 46 resources in the district and it was designated on the National Register in 1990.
ARC-C-8 Brandtown Gin National Register Historic District		Clay County West Point (red area on map at left) Hwy. 47 at Brandtown	Private (multiple owners)	There is no sharp distinction between the district and its rural surroundings, but the related buildings are the best representatives in Clay County of an early-20th century, agricultural/industrial-based economy and farming system. Land in the district is fairly flat, with large trees throughout. Most of the buildings are residential, although the 1905 gin and commissary were focal points. There are a total of 14 resources in the district and it was designated on the National Register in 1991.

ARC-C-9 Commerce Street National Register Historic District		Clay County West Point (red area on map at left) Focused along Commerce Street	Private (multiple owners)	Houses in the district are moderate in size and, especially in the older section, are located close to the street. All of the buildings are one or one-and-a-half stories. All of the homes built before the second decade of the 20th century are wood frame, though the original weatherboard exteriors of some have been altered. Most of the 20th century houses are brick or frame with brick veneer exteriors. All of the buildings in the district are residential. By style, buildings in the district are predominantly Vernacular (either Pyramidal or Gable and Wing). There are 47 resources and it was designated on the National Register in 1990.
ARC-C-10 East Main Street National Register Historic District		Clay County West Point (red area on map at left) Focused along East Main Street	Private (multiple owners)	Residential development along the street began before West Point was a proper town, so some of the largest, oldest homes are interspersed among groupings of later historic buildings. Also, since Main Street has continued to be a prime address, there are numerous examples of mid-20th century infill homes. For most of its length, the district is low density, made up of one and two-story single family residences of a large scale. There are 62 resources in the district and it was designated on the N.R. in 1990.



ARC-C-11 Pheba National Register Historic District		Clay County Pheba (red area on map at left)	Private (multiple owners)	The two buildings that make up this tiny district are the most historically important remaining buildings in what was once the center of the busy town of Pheba. The buildings on the north side of what is now called Pheba Street #2 represent Pheba in its halcyon days (about 1895 to 1935). The McCarter Store is a typical late-19th century rural store (c. 1895). The Post Office building, a former bank (c. 1900), is a nicely detailed one-story brick structure with a parapet facade. The district was designated on the National Register in 1991.
ARC-C-12 West Point Central City National Register Historic District		Clay County West Point (red area on map at left) Focused on where Commerce, Main and Division converge	Private (multiple owners)	This district is a well-preserved commercial /industrial community with good examples of commercial architecture dating from the mid-19th through the early-20th centuries. The district visually traces the development of the city's business community, primarily reflecting its period of greatest growth from the 1870s to the 1920s. Although many buildings have been altered and new buildings constructed within the district, it still retains the nature, scale, and ambience of its turn-of-the-century character. There are 120 resources in the district and it was designated on the National Register in 1982.


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

It features wall murals depicting the discovery of the Mississippi River by famed Spanish explorer Hernando deSoto, who explored the area in 1541-42. It is listed on the National Register.



ARC-D-3 Hernando North Side National Register District		DeSoto County Hernando (red area on map at left)	Private (multiple owners)	The district includes a group of contiguous residential buildings that represent the historical and architectural development from 1850 to 1950, such as: the R.C. Clifton House, a Craftsman style house facing Holly Springs Street; three Greek Revival houses; a Queen Anne house; a Colonial Revival house; and four Tudor Revival examples. A single-pen one-and-a-half-story log house is an outbuilding to the Queen Anne house. This district contains 15 resources and was designated on the N.R. in 2001.
ARC-D-4 Hernando Courthouse Square National Register Historic District		DeSoto County Hernando (red area on map at left) Focused on the Courthouse square	Private and public (multiple owners)	This district is composed of 18 buildings and one outbuilding which face the historic courthouse square on Highway 51 South, Lasher, Caffey and West Commerce Streets. The district's character is commercial, and the buildings were constructed over a period From around 1890 through 1940. The most significant building in the district is the County Courthouse – a neoclassical building built in 1940. The Courthouse Square is an excellent example of the central courthouse square town plan. This district contains 23 resources and was designated on the N.R. in 1998.

To the south are predominately Craftsman and Colonial-inspired houses on School and Park Streets, and on Magnolia Drive. The Hernando Memorial Cemetery is at the south end on Magnolia. This district contains 22 resources and was designated on the N.R. in 2001.
ARC-G-1 Granada Bank		Granada County Granada 223 First Street	Private	Built circa 1845, this two-story brick commercial structure exemplified the bank's financial aspirations in shaping the progress of Grenada, particularly in the subsequent sponsorship of one of the first branch systems in the state. Grenada Bank later became Sunburst Bank then Union Planters Bank and later Regions Bank.
ARC-G-2 The College Inn		Granada County Granada 131 College Street	Private	In 1835, a missionary John Smith operated a tavern here, which was built during the 1830s. After 1840, it housed the Yalobusha Female Institute from which the street took its name. It was a hotel during the Civil War and owned by a man of French descent. Reportedly, it was a French flag flying in the front that stopped a Union officer of French descent from raiding it.

It also contains the city's best collection of Queen Anne style architecture and many were owned by prominent Grenada citizens. The district encompasses parts of three blocks and is located directly south of the downtown. Of the 16 major buildings, all but 4 are contributing to the district's character. In addition to the residences, there are 6 contributing and 3 non-contributing outbuildings, for a total of 18 contributing and 7 non-contributing buildings. This district was designated on the N.R. in 1988.
ARC-G-4 Margin Street National Register Historic District		Granada County Granada (red area on map at left) Focused on a seven-block segment of Margin Street	Private (multiple owners)	This district consists of blocks on Margin and Line Streets, including 27 residences of which 19 are contributing. There are also 7 contributing and 3 non-contributing outbuildings for a total of 26 contributing and 11 non-contributing buildings. Margin Street has two of Grenada's most important homes – the Gollday-Bondurant House and the Moore-Whitaker House. Line Street includes 5 residential buildings from the late-19 th and early-20 th century. This district was designated on the N.R. in 1988.

It includes commercial, residential, religious, educational, and governmental buildings dating from around 1840 to 1950. This district was designated on the National Register in 2001.
ARC-G-6 Holmes County State Park National Register Historic District		Holmes County Durant vicinity (red area on map at left) Off Hwy. 51 four miles south of Durant	Public – State of Mississippi	The park consists of 538 acres, of which approximately 20 acres are included in this district. This was the sixth of ten state parks developed by the Civilian Conservation Corps (CCC). The CCC began creating the park in 1935 and opened it to the public in 1939. Six park cabins and the park manager's residence were built by the CCC, and all were designed in the popular Rustic style of architecture commonly found in state park construction (materials that allow buildings to blend with their natural surroundings). Standardized plans were developed by the National Park Service. This district features 10 resources and was designated on the N.R. in 1997.

The Illinois Central line serves as the eastern edge, Highway 51, serves as the main commercial street and is called Front Street. Aligned along the western side of Front Street is the two-block downtown area of West. There is no grid or regular plan to West. The residences, churches, and educational buildings were constructed behind the commercial area and away from the railroad. Represented in the district are examples of mid- to late-19th and early-20 th century vernacular commercial and residential buildings. This district features 80 resources and was designated on the National Register in 1993.

It was restored in 2008 and is both a Mississippi and National Historic Landmark.
ARC-L-2 The Lyceum		Lafayette County Oxford University of Mississippi campus	University of Mississippi	The University's first structure, the Greek Revival building was begun in 1846 and completed in 1848 of bricks reportedly made at the site. It was originally the campus' sole academic structure (lecture hall, classrooms, geological museum, and library). The north and south wings were added in 1903.
ARC-L-3 Barnard Observatory		Lafayette County Oxford University of Mississippi campus	University of Mississippi	Completed in 1859, this building was named after then-Chancellor F.A.P. Barnard. The central portion was to house the world's largest telescope, but its delivery was prevented by the outbreak of the Civil War. Instead, the telescope went to the Chicago Astronomical Society. Barnard has served many purposes, including a hospital during the Civil War.



Over the years, Ventress housed the Law School, the State Geological Survey, and the geology and arts departments. Renovated in 1998, Ventress now houses the College of Liberal Arts.
ARC-L-5 Lafayette County Courthouse		Lafayette County Oxford Courthouse Square	Lafayette County	This Greek Revival and Italianate style institutional building was constructed of brick in 1872 with the designs of Willis, Sloan, and Trigg. It replaced the previous courthouse that was destroyed by Union forces during the Civil War. It was added onto on the sides in 1903.
ARC-L-6 Oxford City Hall		Lafayette County Oxford 107 Courthouse Square	City of Oxford	Built in 1885 of red brick in the Romanesque style, the former “Federal Building” (US Courthouse and Post Office) was converted for use as the City Hall in 1975.

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

The first services were held Easter Sunday, April 8, 1860. It is the oldest religious structure in Oxford, having survived the burning of the town during the Civil War. It features its original stained glass windows.
ARC-L-8 North Lamar National Register Historic District		Lafayette County Oxford (red area on map at left) Focused on the North Lamar Avenue corridor	Private & Public (multiple owners)	This district includes a rich collection of residential structures north and east of the Courthouse Square. A marked feature of the district is the wide variety of settings of buildings. Broad and tree-lined, Lamar Avenue reflects this plan, with many large houses set back from the street. A wide variety of building styles are found, with Greek Revival, Italianate, Queen Anne, Craftsman, Colonial Revival and Minimal Traditional. The district contains 215 structures and was designated to the National Register in 2007.


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

Buildings range from antebellum mansions built in the Greek Revival and Italianate styles, to Queen Anne cottages for the middle class, to Craftsman bungalows and Colonial Revival houses built during the 1920s. The district was designated to the National Register in 2009.
ARC-L-10 Lyceum-The Circle National Register Historic District		Lafayette County Oxford (red area on map at left) Focal area of campus	Public (University of Mississippi)	In 1962, this area played an integral role in the racial desegregation of the University of Mississippi. Segregationist rioters clashed with federal troops over the court-ordered admittance of African-American student James Meredith. Eight academic buildings are arranged around the perimeter of an interior common called "The Circle." Three resources date to the university's very beginning: the Lyceum (1848), University Circle (1848), and the "Y" Building (1853). The remaining six buildings were built between the late-19th and mid-20th centuries. The district contains 12 structures and was designated to the National Register in 2008.



Rebuilt after its destruction during the Civil War, the courthouse and square were later immortalized by writer William Faulkner. A cohesive ensemble of mid to late-19th-century buildings, the district typifies early 19th-century planning principles. The district contains 72 structures and was designated to the N.R. in 1980.
ARC-Le-1 Oren Dunn City Museum		Lee County Tupelo 689 Rutherford Road	City of Tupelo	This museum features exhibits on the milestones in Tupelo history such, as the 1864 Battle of Tupelo and the 1936 tornado. The Museum grounds house a large collection of buildings reflecting Northeast Mississippi history: 1870s dog-trot cabin, church and school, two fire trucks, 1948 Lee County Book Mobile, Memphis trolley car, and a Frisco Caboose.
ARC-Le-2 Lee County Courthouse		Lee County Tupelo 200 Broadway North	Lee County	This two-story, stone-faced building in the Classical Revival architectural style is situated on a square in Tupelo's downtown. It is the most monumental historic building in the area. Despite renovations in 1966 and 1977, the building retains a high degree of architectural integrity. It was designated to the National Register in 1992.

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ARC-Le-3 Baldwyn National Register Historic District		<p>Lee County Baldwyn (purple areas on map at left) Note: this district had mapping problems precluding the illustration of the district boundaries</p>	<p>Private & Public (multiple owners)</p>	<p>This district has 36 acres, which is bisected by the Lee/Prentiss County line. Baldwyn was chartered in 1861 on the Mobile & Ohio Railroad. The principal industry was cotton. Main Street became the primary commercial center and the businesses were housed in one and two story brick buildings with party walls. One gin building survives, along with some warehouses and three churches. There are 165 contributing resources, and the district was designated to the National Register in 2011.</p>
ARC-Le-4 Highland Circle National Register Historic District		<p>Lee County Tupelo (red areas on map at left)</p>	<p>Private & Public (multiple owners)</p>	<p>This district is the first neighborhood in Tupelo built from a plan for the streets, lots, and setbacks for residential uses. Designed in 1928 by Memphis landscape architect Kenneth Markwell, the majority of houses were built between 1930 and 1949 in a variety of styles, including Tudor Revival, French Renaissance and Colonial Revival. The district includes a neighborhood park and ornamental street lights. There are 97 resources, and the district was designated to the National Register in 2006.</p>

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ARC-Le-5 Mill Village National Register Historic District		Lee County Tupelo (red areas on map at left) Focused along South Green, Maple and Broadway Streets	Private (multiple owners)	This district is a planned industrial community built on a former cotton field. It is located near the center of Tupelo at the intersection of two railroads. Dating from the early-20th century, the district consists of three factory buildings, an auxiliary factory building, and a mill village on approximately thirty acres. There are 77 resources, and the district was designated to the National Register in 1992.
ARC-Le-6 North Broadway National Register Historic District		Lee County Tupelo (red areas on map at left) Focused along a two-block segment of North Broadway Street	Private (multiple owners)	The buildings in this district illustrate the Queen Anne, Colonial Revival, and Craftsman styles popular nationally from 1880 to 1925. They represent a rare example of an intact late-19th and early-20th century Tupelo streetscape in a community which saw most of its pre-1936 housing stock destroyed by a tornado. The town was platted in 1860 as a speculative venture in anticipation of the arrival of the Mobile and Ohio Railroad. It soon became prosperous in rural trade. There are 14 resources, and the district was designated to the National Register in 1985.

Tombigbee State Park was the second of ten state parks in Mississippi developed by the Civilian Conservation Corps (CCC). The CCC began the park in 1934 and opened it to the public in 1938. All the buildings were designed in the popular Rustic style of architecture to blend with their natural surroundings based upon standardized plans developed by the National Park Service. There are 8 contributing and 2 non-contributing resources, and the district was designated to the National Register in 1999.
ARC-Le-8 South Church Street National Register Historic District		Lee County Tupelo (red areas on map at left) Focused along South Church Street	Private (multiple owners)	This district is an early-20th century residential neighborhood on a tree-lined block of S. Church Street between Elliot and Chestnut Streets. The one and two-story houses have a fairly uniform setback. There are 23 houses in the district: 2 Craftsman bungalows, 1 Craftsman house, 13 vernacular bungalows, 2 Colonial Revival houses, 3 foursquares, and 2 frame vernacular houses. There are 23 total resources, and the district was designated to the National Register in 1992.

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ARC-Le-9 Tupelo Homesteads National Register Historic District		Lee County Tupelo vicinity (red area on map at left) Between the Natchez Trace Pkwy. & Hwy. 45 (north of town)	Public (U.S. government)	Between 1934 and 1936, the federal government built a 35-unit subsistence homestead community five miles north of Tupelo, Mississippi. It was built in two phases. Today, the Tupelo Homesteads serve as quarters for employees of Natchez Trace Parkway, a unit of the National Park Service. U.S. Highway 45 bisects the semi-rural community, which is characterized by modest, one-story frame houses on wooded lots averaging 3 acres each. Twenty of the original thirty-five houses and their associated outbuildings remain. The district was designated to the National Register in 1997.

The Federal style is unusual for this part of the country and it is reportedly the oldest brick house in North Mississippi.
ARC-Lo-2 Amzi Love Home		Lowndes County Columbus 305 7th Street South	Private (Sid and Brenda Caradine)	This house was built in 1848 by Mr. Love for his bride Edith Wallace. The primary architectural style is Italianate with Greek and Gothic Revival influences. Features include the brackets under the cornice and arches on the porch with ornate trim. It is listed on the National Register.
ARC- Lo-3 Lincoln Home		Lowndes County Columbus 714 3rd Avenue South	Private (Sid and Brenda Caradine)	Built in 1833, this vernacular cottage features original blue and red Venetian side lights around the front door. It is one of the oldest antebellum residences, and Cicero Lincoln was one of Columbus' first mayors. The house's restoration won a Heritage Award from the Mississippi Heritage Trust in 1999.

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ARC-Lo-4 Rosedale House		Lowndes County Columbus 1523 9th Street South	Private	Built in 1856, this home is considered one of the finest examples of Italianate architecture in Mississippi. Rosedale was recently restored to its original 1856 condition, including original paint colors and wallpaper patterns.
ARC-Lo-5 Bryn Bella		Lowndes County Columbus 1822 Stinson Creek Road	Private	Built in 1848 by the William Cox family and designed by James Lull, this Greek Revival house features heart-pine floors and jib windows accessing multiple porches. Bryn Bella, once a 5,000-acre plantation, is listed on the National Register.

Although the active railroad still bisects the Public Square, no industrial buildings remain. The district is also composed of religious, educational, governmental and social buildings. The first area of commercial development was to the north of the railroad line with two-story balconied buildings. Only three buildings to the north of the rail line remain. The buildings to the northwest of Public Square were replaced by one-story commercial storefronts in the 1950s after a fire that destroyed most of the block. This district consists of 230 resources and was listed on the National Register in 2003.


