

Enabling Legislation

In 1971, Congress established the Chesapeake and Ohio Canal National Historical Park:

"to preserve and interpret the historic and scenic features . . . and develop the potential of the canal for public recreation."

- Public Law 91-664



Why is the National Park Service making this proposal?

Part of agency-wide review to standardize fees for parks that offer similar visitor services and experiences

Tier	Annual Pass	Per Vehicle	Per Person	Motorcycle

Why is the C&O Canal making this proposal? To Improve the Visitor Experience

Over the past five years:

- Visitation increased about 25 percent
- Budget decreased about 10 percent
- Staff decreased about 20 percent



Why is the C&O Canal making this proposal? To Improve the Visitor Experience

Park-wide, over the past five years:

- Reduced mowing, tree removal, campground maintenance, and debris removal from boat ramps, aqueducts, and culverts
- Zero miles of Towpath resurfaced with Operational Funds
- · Closing of Hancock, Ferry Hill, and Georgetown visitor centers
- Reduced hours at Great Falls and Williamsport visitor centers
- Fewer rangers patrolling the Towpath; fewer interpretive programs
- Decommissioning of Georgetown canal boat
- Millions of dollars of maintenance backlog on historic structures
- Visitor injuries on the Towpath

Great Falls Entrance Fee Options

Free Entrance

- Children age 15 and under
- Academic and Scientific Fee Waivers
- National Interagency Passes:
 - Annual Pass for U.S. Military
 - Access Pass free for a lifetime
 - Volunteer Pass free with 250 volunteer hours
- Fee-free Days
 - Nine in 2015

Daily and Annual Pass Options

- Great Falls Daily or Annual Pass
- National Interagency Passes:
 - Annual Pass \$80
 - Senior Pass \$10/lifetime



What do Great Falls entrance fees support?

- 184.5 Miles of Historic Towpath
- Access to 200 miles of Potomac River Shoreline and 15 Boat Ramps
- 37 Campgrounds with Potable Water and Toilets
- 17 Miles of Backcountry Trails
- 19,586 Acres of Land
- Four Visitor Centers and Numerous Interpretive Programs
- Curriculum-based Education Programs
- 3 Historic Districts listed on National Register of Historic Places
- Numerous park publications
- Canal launch boats



How <u>has</u> revenue from fees been used?

- Provide better visitor experience, access, and safety
- Restore and maintain historic and canal structures
- Install interpretive and informational displays and signs







- Clear Hazard Trees





C&O Canal Local Economic Impact

- 100% of fees collected at the C&O Canal are invested in park projects that improve facilities and experiences for park visitors
- C&O Canal is a strong economic engine for the area, hosting more than 5 million visitors a year, making this the 9th most visited unit of the National Park Service
- More than \$80 million is contributed to the local economy each year
- 1,000 jobs related to tourism
