

Letter from Park Superintendent

Dear Friends,

In 2008, we asked for your suggestions as we started the process to plan for the future of Chickamauga and Chattanooga National Military Park. Subsequently the National Park Service (NPS) determined that the planning needs for Lookout Mountain Battlefield and Moccasin Bend National Archeological District (Moccasin Bend) could be better addressed in separate planning efforts. The plan for Lookout Mountain Battlefield has been completed and we are now turning our attention to Moccasin Bend. Over the last few months, the planning team has pulled information from previous planning efforts, including your comments, to produce the proposed alternatives for Moccasin Bend described in this newsletter. When the planning process is completed, this general management plan amendment will help guide our decision making for Moccasin Bend for the next 20 years.

Input from tribes, input from agencies and organizations, and recent reports on Moccasin Bend (a development concept plan for the gateway site and a cultural landscape report) have contributed to the development of the preliminary alternative concepts for Moccasin Bend.

We are now seeking your thoughts, suggestions, and comments on the alternatives provided in this newsletter. Sharing your ideas and concerns for management of Moccasin Bend will help us make the best decisions for the park.






The Plan's Purpose

General management plans represent the broadest level of planning conducted for a national park and provide guidance for making informed decisions about the future of park resource conditions and visitor experiences.

The purpose of the general management plan amendment / environmental assessment is to develop the plan to guide management of Moccasin Bend National Archeological District for the next 20 years. When complete, this plan will amend the general management plan completed for the national military park in 1988. At the time, Moccasin Bend was not part of the park and therefore was not included in the plan. The planning team is considering how to provide appropriate access to Moccasin Bend while protecting tribal interests and the nationally significant and sensitive resources at the park. This includes how to orient visitors to the park and management of current and proposed trails. The team is considering potential partnerships as well as linkage efforts by the City of Chattanooga related to bicycle access along Moccasin Bend Road and connections to the Tennessee River Blueway.

Moccasin Bend Management Zones

Management zoning outlines the criteria for appropriate uses and facilities necessary to support the desired conditions. Some desired conditions may apply parkwide, but the delineation of management zones illustrates where there are differences in intended resource conditions, visitor experiences, and management activities (NPS *Management Policies 2006*). Each zone defines a set of desired conditions for cultural resources, natural resources, visitor experiences, and appropriate visitor activities and identifies appropriate types of facilities.

These desired conditions are different in each management zone and reflect the overall focus of that particular zone. Three management zones have been developed for Moccasin Bend National Archeological District: a cultural protection zone, a cultural interpretation zone, and a visitor services zone.

Overview	These areas would be managed to ensure the protection of historic and archeological sites. Visitor access would be strictly managed to protect these sites, while still providing visitors with limited opportunities to experience and learn about these cultural resources.	These areas would be managed to protect and interpret the area's cultural resources, including American Indian and Civil War history. Visitors would have opportunities to experience cultural resources through low-impact interpretive programming, self-discovery, and ranger-led tours.	These areas would be managed to provide visitors with opportunities to learn about and enjoy Moccasin Bend. This zone would provide orientation amenities and services that support a safe and satisfying visitor experience. This zone contains most of the visitor and administrative facilities of the unit. A wide variety of activities, programs, and facilities may be provided, which support higher levels of visitor use, including special events, and educational and interpretive opportunities.		
Cultural Resources	This zone would include the most sensitive cultural resources. Cultural resources would be regularly monitored to ensure their protection. Visitor activities would be controlled to allow for access with the least amount of impact. The tolerance for adverse impacts would be very low—resource protection would take precedence over visitor use.	This zone would be managed to provide a high level of resource protection. Emphasis would be on preserving/maintaining the resources contributing to the district's national historic landmark designation. Resources would be periodically monitored to ensure they are protected. Some minimal impacts could be allowed for research and interpretation purposes.	Some impacts to cultural resources from visitors and development would be tolerated in this zone. Impacts would be minimized through careful planning, design, and monitoring.		
Natural Resources	Natural resources would be managed to preserve and protect the area's historic and archeological resources.	Cultural resources would be preserved with low levels of impacts on natural resources. Natural resources would be managed to preserve and protect archeological resources and historic sites. Selective vegetation clearing could occur to enhance historic views.	Natural resources would be managed to maintain the character of the cultural and historic setting, and to provide for visitor use.		
Visitor Experience	Visitor access would be limited to maximize resource protection. Public access to some archeology sites would be limited to only ranger-led tours. Users that are entitled to access under federal laws (e.g., authorized tribal members under the American Indian Religious Freedom Act) would be allowed to enter the zone.	The primary experience in this zone would be visiting and learning about the area's cultural resources. Visitors would be provided a wide range of interpretation and education opportunities. Visitors could expect moderate levels of encounters with other visitors. However, visitors still would have the opportunity to experience some solitude, tranquility, and quiet.	Frequent levels of interaction with visitors, NPS staff, and programs would be expected. A variety of interpretive opportunities may be provided to promote visitor education about the resources and their values.		
Appropriate Visitor Activities	Only ranger-guided tours would occur.	Low-impact activities could include walking, hiking, self-guided interpretation, and guided walks. Self- discovery options would be available. Most visitors would access the area by foot	A variety of low-impact activities would be permitted; including walking, hiking, self-guided interpretation, and ranger programs. Appropriate Types of Facilities	Minimal developments, such as unpaved trails, may be provided in a manner that avoids sensitive archeological sites and features.	Trails, interpretive waysides, and signs may be provided, however, they will be designed to protect cultural resources. Facilities would be unobtrusive and blend with the natural and cultural environment.	Facilities may include a visitor center, orientation plaza, administration space, storage buildings, parking areas, roads, paved walkways and multi-use trails, benches, interpretive kiosks, restrooms, cultural demonstration areas, docks, overlooks, and utilities		

Alternatives


The National Park Service is required to examine a full range of reasonable alternatives when preparing an environmental assessment. Reasonable alternatives propose different ways to fulfill the purpose and need of the plan, while minimizing impacts to national park resources. Reasonable alternatives are also economically and technically feasible and evidence common sense. Alternative A - No Action

Concept and general actions

Continuation of current management so no new access opportunities would be provided. Only actions would be those that are already planned, existing, or funded.

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Recommended actions by area				
Gateway site	 No additional visitor orientation planned. Gate opened only for special events and programs. Maintain current parking along the road near the fence. 			
Brown's Ferry Federal Road property	 Maintain existing trails, wayside exhibits, and viewsheds. Continue to maintain existing parking area. Continue to provide opportunity for self-guided tours and occasional ranger-led tours. 			
Riverside easements on east / south / west sides of Moccasin Bend	NPS would not exercise easements to develop trails.			
Blue Blazes Trail	 Maintain current trail and parking area. Ranger-led and self-guided access. No wayside exhibits. 			
Archeological sites on the west side	Continue scheduled ranger-led tours from the south parking area.			
Stringers Ridge including Civil War Earthworks	 Interpretive sites would remain undeveloped. Continue limited access to site through periodic ranger-led tours. Self-guided access permitted on unmarked, unimproved trail. 			
South parking area	 Gate opened only for special events and programs. Continue to maintain parking area. 			
Bicycle use	No new access.			




Alternative B

Concept and general actions

Visitors would have opportunities to learn about the park resources at a visitor center, through ranger-guided tours and cultural demonstrations.

Gateway site	Zone: Visitor Services Zone
Guteway Site	Gateway site would include a staffed visitor center with museum exhibits, a film, and interpretive messaging.




Alternative C

Concept and general actions

Visitors would have opportunities to learn about the park resources through self-guided experiences using network of roads and trails that would include outdoor interpretive exhibits.


Concept and general actions

The visitor could learn about the park resources from a NPS ranger at a partner facility; this facility could be in

Chattanooga or elsewhere.

On-site, visitors would have opportunities to learn about the park through mainly self-guided experiences on a network of roads and trails that would include outdoor interpretive exhibits.
