Wetland Restoration Action Plan Environmental Assessment


The National Park Service's (NPS) National Capital Region (NCR) is proposing to prepare a Wetland Restoration Action Plan (WRAP) for four parks within the NCR:

- Catoctin Mountain Park
- Chesapeake & Ohio Canal National Historical Park
- Harpers Ferry National Historical Park
- · Monocacy National Battlefield

An Environmental Assessment is being prepared to evaluate potential impacts of the proposed project on the natural resources, cultural resources, and visitor experience at the four NCR parks, in accordance with National Environmental Policy Act.











Purpose of the Wetland Restoration Action Plan

The purpose of the WRAP is to provide a comprehensive approach to restoring, enhancing, and/ or protecting wetlands, waterways, and stream habitats at the four NCR parks. The approach would prioritize specific areas within the parks and provide specific restoration actions for these areas to deal with degraded natural resource conditions or deficiencies.

The Wetland Restoration Action Plan aims to:

- Provide a step-by-step framework for park managers to complete restoration projects once funding is secured
- Identify wetland and stream areas within each park for potential restoration/ enhancement activities
- Assess baseline conditions of the parks' wetlands and streams, internal and external influences on wetlands and streams, and potential future threats
- Prioritize potential wetland and stream enhancement projects
- Help protect the parks' resources from continued degradation from increased stream erosion and other influences
- Identify opportunities where mitigation requirements could occur when wetlands and streams are either damaged or lost due to construction projects
- Assist the parks in tracking improvements to wetlands and streams and their overall contribution to protecting the Chesapeake Bay Watershed

The four parks manage their wetland and stream resources as issues arise, with the help from volunteers and nonprofit organizations, and address outside applicants that have projects that would affect park wetlands. Currently, there is not a consistent way the parks are mitigating impacts to wetlands.

The NPS announces a 30-day public scoping period to solicit public comments for the proposed WRAP. During this scoping period, the public is invited to identify any issues or concerns they may have with the proposed plan so that the NPS can appropriately consider them in the Environmental Assessment.
