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

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Project Background

Traditionally associated tribes are tribes that

- regard park resource as essential to its development and continued identity as a culturally distinct people
- association with the park has endured for at least two generations

the association began prior to the establishment of the park

Mutual Respect Among Tribes

- Acknowledge the distinct identities of each tribe
- Prepare tribally specific protocols for demonstrations
- Culturally appropriate crafts for demonstrations
- Support tribal economies



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Project Purpose and Need

The purpose of this project is to increase opportunities for first voice tribal interpretation, improve visitor orientation, and enhance the overall visitor experience at Desert View in Grand Canyon National Park.

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What is the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969 (NEPA)?

- Requires federal agencies to
 - Analyze the environmental impacts of federal actions

Engage the public and federally recognized tribes in the decision-making process

The federal agency prepares a written Environmental Assessment to determine if a federal undertaking would significantly affect the human environment

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What is Public Scoping?


- The beginning of the NEPA process
- An opportunity for the public to provide early ideas about:
 - the purpose and need for the plan
 - issues and impact topics that should be addressed
 - alternatives that should be evaluated
 - sources of information that should be considered
- Public scoping began February 5, 2018 and runs through March 6, 2018
- You can provide comments at any time during this period

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Proposed Action


- Increase opportunities for authentic first-voice tribal interpretation
- Improve visitor orientation
- Enhance overall visitor experience
- Proactively respond to increasing visitation
- Embrace a unique opportunity to partner with associated tribes



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
- Remove underutilized shade structures
- Remove the central walkway
- Construct new restroom facility near parking area
- Adaptive reuse of former visitor center building or
- Construct a cultural center



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


- Formalizing east and west rim trails
- Expand or improve existing amphitheater
- Construct a performance area
- Improve site accessibility
- Improve utility infrastructure



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- Create outdoor demonstration area suitable to food
- Remove unnecessary paths and revegetate and naturalize areas
- Relocate bus drop-off areas
- Add additional picnic areas






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NATIONAL PARK SERVICE
