Annual Status Report:

George Washington's Boyhood Home National Historic Landmark, 2017

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George Washington Foundation

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The staff of the archaeology department at Ferry Farm enjoyed another productive year in 2017. Their accomplishments included progress in the areas of conservation archives, standard laboratory processing, artifact conservation, specialist analysis, and significant reduction of the artifact backlog. Department staff completed the technical report on the 2014 field season as well. They also made a number of presentations to the public. Their field work consisted of archaeological monitoring of ground disturbing activities related to construction activities.

Fieldwork

2017 Field Season – There was no field season or block excavation in 2017.

Archaeological Construction Monitoring

For the work reviewed and approved in 2015, and detailed in the 2015 Assessment of Actions form and its supporting reports and plans, monitoring activities continued on January 2, 2017 and were conducted intermittently through October. Construction activities included the interpretive structure and the installation of a new entrance road, an extensive pedestrian pathway system, multiple interpretive yard fences, and a utility trench that connected the interpretive structure to a new utility building.

Archaeological monitoring of all these construction projects was conducted as per the approval-conditions of 2015. Daily observation logs detailed the work accomplished and monthly reports were submitted summarizing the results. Staff supplied revisions or additional information when requested by the reviewers. Construction of the new entrance road afforded us a look at a cross-section of what may be an original 18th century entranceway from Rt. 3 (called Kings Highway in the eighteenth century), and the installation of the pedestrian pathway uncovered the remains of an early 20th century farm building. Both discoveries are being documented in the Virginia Dept. of Historic Resources' VCRIS system.

Minimal Vessel Count and Cross Mending Projects:

- Wig Curler Analysis Project: cross-mended wig curler fragments in order to create an estimate of the percentage of this artifact class that has been recovered to date.

- Photographed and prepared treatment reports for archaeological artifacts in need of conservation. Performed minor treatment (cleaning artifacts and storing them in Escal) of several metal objects under the guidance of conservator Howard Wellman (Howard Wellman Conservation LLC).
- Reorganized the conservation records, including hard copy and digital.
- Hired Howard Wellman Conservation in Halethorpe, Maryland to conserve metal, stone, and composite artifacts including a hearthstone that was once part of the Washington House.
- Continued efforts collecting atmospheric data for the Visitor Center building in new areas by gathering systematic hygrometer.
- Downloaded and labeled digital photographs.

Specialist Analysis-

Small Finds – Small Finds Analyst Laura Galke conducted small finds analysis.

Ceramics and Glass – Glass and Ceramics Specialist Mara Kaktins conducted ceramics- and glass research on objects recovered from Ferry Farm.

Colonial Period Figurines Analysis Lab Director Melanie Marquis continued conducting indepth research into Agatized Figurines recovered at Ferry Farm.
