Description of Action (Project Description):

This project originally provided for the demolition and/or cleanup of abandoned buildings, equipment, and junk on the NPS acquired Moose, Bueno, and Taybo mining claims in Kantishna. Buildings, shacks and tent frames, deemed unsafe or unsuitable, were dismantled and old mining equipment recycled, reused, or disposed of as surplus.

The scope of this Component C of PMIS 119809 is to excavate two of the original 14 sites (5 & 13) and collect confirmation samples below the previous zone of contamination. In a meeting with ADEC on 6/27/18, they indicated they would allow closure of these sites if it could be demonstrated that the Diesel Range Organic concentrations are less than cleanup amounts at depth. Excavation work will be performed with hand tools and/or auger and the samples are to be processed and tested by a contractor.
