#### Waterford NHL District Survey & National Historic Landmark Documentation Project

# Prepared by the Center for Historic Architecture and Design for the National Park Service, National Capital Region, National Historic Landmarks Program March 4 2019

Note: This research design is an early stage estimate of timelines and work plans. Details may be subject to change in response to project needs or unforeseen obstacles.

Objectives: This project will provide updated documentation for the National Historic Landmark district in Waterford, Virginia. Objectives for the project include the survey/resurvey all properties within the district boundaries, which includes approximately 180 parcels. The field survey will record key architectural data and landscape elements, and will also assess each property's current condition, evaluate their contributing vs. noncontributing status to the NHL district, and note what historic trends and themes are reflected by the resources surveyed. Field survey will thus provide a baseline of updated data for properties within the district, while also informing the compilation of an updated nomination form for the National Historic Landmark, containing updated historical context and a clarified national significance statement. The intent is to update the NHL documentation to meet current NPS standards.

<u>Methodology:</u> The project will encompass three distinct phases, including research/preparation, field survey, and the authoring and compiling of the NHL nomination. The project will initiate with start-up and kickoff meetings with stakeholders and participants, including representatives from the National Park Service, Virginia Department of Historic Resources (SHPO), Loudoun County, and the Waterford Foundation, as well as property owners in Waterford. Concurrently, initial data on Waterford's history and its historic resources will be compiled and evaluated in preparation for the field survey and the creation of updated NHL documentation.

The field survey, which will commence in December, will include a reconnaissance-level survey (based on Virginia Department of Historic Resources standards) of each property that is located within the boundaries of the Waterford Historic District. Data collected will include key architectural features, including architectural style, building form, and materials, as well as any outbuildings and/or notable landscape features. Photographic documentation will also be completed for each property. Data collected will be submitted to the Virginia Department of Historic Resources via the VCRIS system and in hard copy.

Field data will be combined with historical research, including written histories, preservation-related reports, maps, and available primary sources, to update the nomination form for Waterford's National Historic Landmark district. This will include an expanded discussion of the nationally-significant portions of Waterford's history, and clarification on its eligibility as a National Historic Landmark.

### <u>Potential Areas & Periods of Significance:</u>

#### Criterion 4: Category: Architecture (c.1733-c. 1900)

Waterford represents a highly significant survival of a comprehensive architectural landscape, encompassing over 150 years of intact buildings, displaying a remarkable array of time periods, styles, materials, forms, scale, and types. This architectural diversity, and the integrity of the collection of buildings and their surrounding rural landscape, set the stage for a remarkable preservation effort beginning during the 1930s.

### Criterion 1: Category: Conservation (Historic Preservation: c.1936-c.1990s?)

Waterford represents a one-of-a-kind historic landscape because of an extraordinary and progressive local preservation movement that began during the first half of the twentieth century. This period started with the Chamberlin brothers' restoration efforts in Waterford during the late-1930s, and continued with the subsequent founding of the Waterford Foundation in 1943. A series of innovative preservation efforts throughout the twentieth century resulted in a preserved villagescape of unmatched integrity.

#### Criterion 1: Category: Ethnic Heritage (1733-1870)

This seems like the least viable of the potential national Areas of Significance (if we are arguing for exceptional national significance, with comparative justification), but we will continue to explore Waterford's unique history as a settlement dominated by southeastern Pennsylvanians, especially Quakers, as well as African Americans, contributing to a unique cultural, social, and architectural landscape in Virginia. More than likely, however, this history will be merged with the discussion of the diversity of architectural expression in Waterford (Criterion 4).
