## **Categorical Exclusion Form**

Project: Rehabilitate Igloo Forest Segment of the Denali Park Road, Phase I

Description of Action (Project Description):

This project will be completed by NPS day labor crews in conjunction with a hired contractor. The contractor will be responsible for delivering aggregate from non NPS quarries to the project site. This project would fund two equipment operators and two laborers employed by NPS. It would also fund a local contractor and its staff.Rehabbing Igloo Forest will consist of replacing all existing culverts and adding an additional one foot lift of gravel material to the driving surface. Igloo forest will be broken into two sections. Section A will be from Teklanika Bridge to MP 32.5. Section B will be from MP 32.5 to the Igloo Bridge at MP 34. Section A will be completed in year one. Section B will continue the following year if funding allows. All 18" culverts in section A will be replaced with 24" culverts to increase flow. An 8" base layer of select borrow will be hauled and placed by the contractor. NPS crews will grade the material to Road Design Standards with NPS owned equipment. After the select borrow base layer is graded and compacted, a 4" finish course layer of 1" minus will be applied. The contractor will haul and place the finish course and NPS crews will grade to Road Design Standards.

Consider closing Igloo Campground during the second year of work. Campground conversation should be brought before the DMT. Delivery during times of year when there is minimal impact to visitors and the road itself - consider spring and fall deliveries as well as timing of deliveries relative to other traffic during the day.

This is the second stage of Rehabilitating Igloo Forest (Section B). This project will be completed by NPS day labor crews in conjunction with a hired contractor. The contractor will be responsible for delivering aggregate from non NPS quarries to the project site. This project would fund two equipment operators and two laborers employed by NPS. It would also fund a local contractor and its staff.Rehabbing Igloo Forest will consist of replacing all existing culverts and adding an additional one foot lift of gravel material to the driving surface. Igloo forest will be broken into two sections. Section A will be from Teklanika Bridge to MP 32.5. Section B will be from MP 32.5 to the Igloo Bridge at MP 34. Section A is complete. Section B will commence under this project.All 18" culverts in section A will be replaced with 24" culverts to increase flow. An 8" base layer of select borrow will be hauled and placed by the contractor. NPS crews will grade the material to Road Design Standards with NPS owned equipment. After the select borrow base layer is graded and compacted, a 4" finish course layer of 1" minus will be applied.
