What is a Special Resource Study?



Special Resource Studies

- evaluate the potential for establishing a new park unit within the National Park Service (NPS) based on established Special Resource Study criteria; and
- are prepared for the Secretary of the Interior, who will submit the study along with his/her recommendations, if any, to Congress.

This study itself does not establish new national park units.

 Only Congress through legislated action or the President through the use of the Antiquities Act has the authority to establish a new unit of the national park system.

The Polk Home

 Built in 1816, this is the only surviving residence of James K. Polk other than the White House. Visitors can see original possessions of President and Mrs. Polk including furniture, paintings, clothing, and White House china.





The Sisters' House

 Built in 1818 and inhabited by two of President Polk's married sisters, today the building serves as a visitor center and administrative offices. Guests start their visit with a 12-minute orientation video before exploring the rest of the property. The Sisters' House also houses a museum room and a museum shop.





Kitchen Outbuilding

 The Polk Home's detached kitchen building was reconstructed in 1946 on the original foundation. Visitors to the kitchen see period cooking implements and household accessories.





Gardens

 The site's landscaped grounds include an herb garden, a formal boxwood garden, and a white azalea garden. The gardens feature objects and plantings from the grounds of James K. Polk's final home, a downtown Nashville mansion that was torn down in 1901.





Polk Presidential Hall

Constructed in 1882 as a church, the Polk
 Association acquired the building in 2006 and
 began a three-year restoration project to preserve
 the historic exterior and renovate the interior as a
 state-of-the-art museum gallery. This exhibition
 facility hosts a series of original and traveling
 exhibits that relate to the U.S. Presidency and
 American society and culture during James K. Polk's
 lifetime.



Current Management

Use congressionally established criteria:

- 1. National Significance
- 2. Suitability
- з. Feasibility
- 4. Need for NPS Management



National Significance | Criterion 1




- Contains nationally significant natural and/or cultural resources
- For cultural resources, National Historic Landmark criteria are applied to determine whether a site is nationally significant



Suitability | Criterion 2



- Represents a natural or cultural resource that is not already adequately represented in the national park system, **OR**
- Is not comparably represented and protected for public enjoyment by another management entity



Feasibility | Criterion 3



- Sufficient size and appropriate configuration to ensure longterm protection of the resources and visitor enjoyment
- Capable of efficient administration by the National Park Service at a reasonable cost



Other Important Feasibility Factors





- √Landownership patterns
- √Acquisition costs
- ✓Life cycle maintenance costs
- √Access
- √Threats to the resource
- ✓Staff or development requirements

Need for NPS Management | Criterion 4



Requires direct National Park Service management that is clearly superior to other management approaches.


Linear Process
