


#### What is a National Monument?

- All units of the national park system, including national monuments, are places that are set aside for the preservation and public enjoyment of their resources and values.
- In 2019, Congress authorized the creation of the Medgar and Myrlie Evers National Monument in the John D. Dingell, Jr. Conservation, Management, and Recreation Act (P.L. 116-9).
- Tougaloo College donated the Evers home to the National Park Service. In December 2020, the property was established as the 423rd unit of the National Park System.
- In National Park Service parlance, all national park units are called "national parks."



### Why was Medgar and Myrlie Evers Home National Monument created?

Medgar and Myrlie Evers were partners in the struggle for civil rights.

On June 12, 1963, the assassination of Medgar Evers in the carport of their home at 2332 Margaret W. Alexander Drive in Jackson, Mississippi, became the first murder of a nationally significant leader of the national civil rights movement.

It also became a catalyst for passage of the Civil Rights Act of 1964.





Medgar and Myrlie Evers Home National Monument was created to preserve, protect, and interpret for the benefit of present and future generations resources associated with the pivotal roles of Medgar and Myrlie Evers in the American civil rights movement.








#### What is a Foundation Document?



### Foundation Documents

- Serve as the underlying guidance for management and planning decisions in a national park unit.
- Describe the core mission of the park.
- Communicate a single, shared understanding of the purpose and significance of the park, and the resources and values are fundamental to achieving its purpose and maintaining its significance.



# What a Foundation Document is Not

- It does not describe <u>how</u> to manage, but <u>what</u> to manage
- It is <u>not a decision document</u> that involves a range of alternatives
- Rather, it will be the underlying document that provides guidance for future management decisions



## Why are Foundations useful?

- Starting Point Basis for consistency in park planning and decision making
- Focus Efforts on protecting the park's fundamental resources and values
- Strategic Planning -
  - Identifies conditions, threats, issues, and opportunities facing a park's fundamental resources and values
  - Identifies and prioritizes future planning and data needs
- Communicate A valuable communication tool



#### **Key Components**

Purpose - Identifies why the park was designated

Significance - Identifies what is important about the park

Fundamental Resources Values - Fulfill the park's purpose & maintaining its significance

Interpretive Themes - Stories that connect visitors to the park's significance, resources & values




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#### **Project Timeline**







