(16 U.S.C. §§6801-6814)

Authorizes NPS to charge fees

 Fee revenue retained by NPS for visitor services & improvements

80% revenue stays in park



Shenandoah National Park is Fee Area

 All visitors entering the park should pay an entrance fee or have a pass

- Seasonal BC Rangers
- Maintenance of trails
- Campsite rehabilitation
- Clean up trash

- SAR Equipment & Training
- Ambulance Lease









Increase Campground Fees

Four Campgrounds

• Fees have been at \$15 & \$20 - 2006/7

• Operational costs continue to increase

Comparable sites

• NPS in VA – \$14 - \$30

• VA State Parks - \$25 - \$45

• Private- \$25 - \$59

- Proposal 2022
 - \$30 for individual site
 - \$75 for group site



Campground Fees

What do they do?

- Pay for operational cost, such as
 - Campground staff
 - Cleaning Comfort Stations
 - Treat of Water & Wastewater
 - Managing Trash / Recycling
- Improvements
 - New Picnic Tables
 - Replace Fire Rings
 - Add Food Storage boxes
 - Rehab Camp sites

Backcountry Camping Current

- 60,000 BC nights annually
 - top 10 for NPS
- Backcountry Plan allows dispersed camping
 - ~500 visitor chosen active sites
 - 49 constructed campsites along AT
- Current permits are antiquated
 - Costly to process
 - Not real time
- 65% of permits use AT corridor
 - Benefit from infrastructure on AT









Backcountry Camping Fee Proposal

- Require a permit with a fee
- Use recreation.gov to obtain
 - Collect same information
- Emphasis on park rules and Leave No Trace principles
- Trip planning info on-line
- Implement in 2023
- Fee \$20-\$30 per trip









Old Rag PILOT Project Why this project?

- Pilot phase will collect information to guide management of this area
- Visitors indicated support for daily limits
 - ensure safety and protect resources
- 75% of users felt crowded
 - waited 5-10 or >10 min at Chute
- 12% of people turned around
- Social trails
- Trampling of rare plants
- Safety / High number of incidents
- Education opportunity





Old Rag PILOT Project Proposal


- Pilot Period
 - March November 2022
- Start at 800 Tickets/Day, 1 per hiker.
- Reserve on recreation.gov
 - 50% 30 days prior
 - 50% 5 days prior
- Max 4 tickets per transaction
 - >80% of groups are 4 or less people.
- Visitors require ticket to enter the trail
- Small initial fee (\$1-2) only pays for online system
 - Future fees to support operation if deemed successful
