El Paso Natural Gas Company's Proposal to Lower Several Segments of its Natural Gas Transmission Line No. 1008 within the Tucson Mountain District of Saguaro National Park, West of the City of Tucson, Arizona

Project Scoping

Dear Interested Party:

The National Park Service (NPS) is currently reviewing a proposal from El Paso Natural Gas Company ("EPNG") to lower several segments of its natural gas transmission Line No. 1008 within the Tucson Mountain District of Saguaro National Park ("the Park"), west of the city of Tucson, Arizona.

EPNG operates two high-pressure natural gas pipelines buried in a 30-foot-wide right-of-way (ROW) in the northeastern portion of the Park. During normal inspections, conducted pursuant to and in accordance with federal law, EPNG discovered four locations within the Park where Line No. 1008 has been exposed as the result of storm-water runoff. EPNG proposes to remove these exposed pipeline segments (totaling approximately 700') and replace them with new pipe, which will be buried at a depth that will ensure the continued integrity and safety of the pipeline. New fill dirt will be added where necessary to adequately cover the new pipeline, and the dirt will be compacted and graded. Water bars will be added to improve drainage and prevent future washouts, and the disturbed areas will be restored and re-vegetated to industry standards.

An Environmental Assessment (EA) will be prepared in compliance with the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) to provide the decision-making framework that 1) considers reasonable alternatives to meet project objectives, 2) evaluates the impacts of the proposed project to the environment, and 3) identifies potential mitigation measures to minimize potential impacts.

NPS encourages public participation throughout the NEPA process. There will be two opportunities for the public to comment on the project: once during initial project scoping and again following release of the EA. We are currently in the scoping phase of this project, and I invite the public to voice their ideas, comments, or concerns.



ALTERNATIVES

The preliminary alternatives to be evaluated in the EA, including the proposed action, are as follows:

Alternative 1. No Action. "No-Action" means the project would not take place. This alternative represents the baseline against which to compare the proposed action and other alternatives.

Alternative 2. Proposed Action. Under the proposed action, EPNG would excavate, remove, and replace approximately 700 feet of pipe at four washout locations along Line No. 1008. Reclamation activities would include seeding, revegetation, and installation of water bars to prevent future erosion.
