3	Public scoping was initiated with an article in the Star-Herald on July 25, 2010 that described
4	the proposed action and publicized a public open house meeting held on July 27, 2010 (Appendix
5	A). The park also sent scoping letters describing the proposed action and requesting comments
6	to interested individuals; organizations; state, county, and local governments; and federal
7	agencies. American Indian tribes were also sent an information letter describing the project and
8	asking for comments.
9	This EA was forwarded to the Nebraska State Historical Society for review and comment.
10	The park would coordinate with the Nebraska State Historical Society in the development of
11	mitigation measures for historic structures.
12	The USFWS will review this EA to determine if they concur with the park's findings of effect
13	and whether additional conservation measures are needed to protect listed species.
